ABOUT THE VENUE

Having opened on 30th October 1971, the Sport Wales National Centre here at Sophia Gardens in Cardiff recently celebrated its 50th birthday.

It was established by the then Sports Council for Wales in 1971 as the National Sports Centre for Wales, with the official opening by HRH The Princess Anne on 12th June 1972.

Set up to assist the development of elite athletes in Wales, it was renamed the Welsh Institute of Sport in 1994 and, since 2010, it has been known under its current name – the Sport Wales National Centre. The centre is owned and operated by Sport Wales.

The venue hosted the Northern Europeans in 2009 of course and, more recently, also staged the MAG British Championships in September 2021. Wales' elite gymnasts also train at the centre.

About Welsh Gymnastics...

Welsh Gymnastics (WG), the national governing body for gymnastics in Wales, have been based at the Sport Wales National Centre since 2010.

As a governing body WG lead, develop, support and act as the guardian of the sport in Wales. WG's mission is for Wales to be recognised as a leading gymnastics nation, producing world-class champions and creating vibrant, inclusive communities where every gymnast has a high-quality experience.

It's a story that goes back to 1902, when the Welsh Amateur Gymnastics Association (WAGA) was founded. By 2004, Welsh Gymnastics had dropped their amateur status and become a company limited by guarantee.

CARDIFF - DID YOU KNOW?

Cardiff is the Capital

Cardiff was granted city status in 1905, but it was another 50 years before it was declared the capital of Wales. This makes Cardiff not only one of the smallest capitals in Europe but also one of the newest.

King Coal

Cardiff is a city made famous for exporting coal. The revenue generated through the exportation of coal enabled the city to continue to grow and develop, and by the 20th century, it was the greatest exporter of coal in the world. In 1862, 2 million tonnes of coal were exported from Cardiff Docks; by 1913, this had risen to nearly 11 million. This was the heyday of the coal industry before the depression of the 1930s.

A City of Castles


Cardiff is widely regarded as being the city with the most castles in the world. The most famous amongst these is Cardiff Castle, which has stood for nearly 2,000 years at the heart of the city. Other famous castles rich in the history of Cardiff city that can also be discovered include Castell Coch and St Fagans Castle, an Elizabethan manor house now part of St Fagans National History Museum.

One in a Million

The first £1 million deal anywhere in the world was completed in the Cardiff Coal Exchange, now a hotel in Mount Stuart Square in the Cardiff Bay area, in 1907.

A Famous Oak Door

Before being offered a full-time position as the Welsh Men's National Coach in 2010, Peter Haysham worked as a qualified wood-machinist/joiner. One of his creations, now more than 20 years ago, is the oak door for the West Lodge building (Pettigrew Tearooms) at the entrance to Bute Park in the heart of Cardiff city centre.



World Record

Cardiff is home to the World's oldest record store. Spiller's Records is one of Cardiff's most beloved landmarks, established all the way back in 1894! The store specialised in the sale of phonographs, wax phonograph cylinders and shellac phonograph discs. Today, Spillers sells an array of CDs and records as well as hosting live gigs and events. These days it is located in the historic Morgan's Arcade.

Ghostly Tale

The National Museum of Wales in Cardiff's civic centre is believed to be haunted by the ghost of Dunbar Smith, the architect of the building, who it's said was offended when his ashes were removed to make way for a public toilet!

Cardiff's Zoo

Victoria Park was once home to Cardiff's zoo and was full of exotic animals. Over the years the collection grew to include Wally the Kangaroo, peacocks, gazelles, parrots, raccoons, and a three-foot long alligator. The owners declined the offer of lions and Indian snakes. The zoo rivalled Bristol's more famous offering right up to WW1. By 1935 all that remained was a peacock, guinea pigs, and some hares.

Roald Dahl

The world-famous children's author Roald Dahl was born and bred in Cardiff. He grew up in Llandaff and was christened in the Norwegian Church in Cardiff Bay. There is a Roald Dahl Pass in the city centre in his memory.

Home of the Doctor

If you are a fan of Doctor Who then welcome to his home city. The show has long been produced at the BBC's Roath Lock Drama village in Cardiff Bay. Many scenes have been filmed at various locations across the city, so when you look around you might get a sense of déjà vu. Filming locations have included St Mary's Street, The National Museum of Wales, Westgate Street, Cardiff Castle, Llandaff, Dyffryn Gardens and many sites in the Bay area.

Vital Statistics

Cardiff has a population of 478,000 and covers just 140 km². It is the 11th largest city in the UK. It has more green space per person than any other city in the UK and is among the best for cyclists.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

We are delighted to offer a warm welcome to all delegations to Cardiff for the 2021 Northern Europeans and allows the chance once again to meet up with gymnastics friends.

This year's event is the 19th edition of the Northern Europeans and comes 20 years on since the inaugural event which was staged in Finland back in 2001.

No doubt this weekend will provide plenty of memorable moments and standout performances – just as the previous 18 editions of the competition have over the past two decades.

Having last hosted in 2009, Wales is proud to once again be staging this event here in Cardiff, albeit a year later than originally planned.

That event 12 years ago saw both the Wales MAG and WAG teams winning gold.

For the women, that triumph was the second in a fabulous run of seven team golds in eight years at the Northern Europeans between 2008-15. In fact, many of the gymnasts who competed at this event during those years went on to win medals at future Commonwealth Games, including the likes of Jessica Hogg, Elizabeth Beddoe, Georgina Hockenhull, Angel Romaeo, Raer Theaker and Latalia Bevan.

More recently, the WAG team of Mia Evans, Holly Jones, Jea Maracha, Poppy Stickler and Emily Thomas also won team gold for Wales the last time the Northern Europeans were held in 2019 – in Kópavogur, Iceland – with Norway (Nora Irgens, Mari Kanter, Mali Neurauter, Marie Rønbeck and Juliane Tøssebro) in second and Finland (Lea Bernards, Iida Haapala, Enni Kettunen, Lilian Langenskiöld and Malla Montell) third.

Meanwhile this year, the Welsh men's artistic gymnasts will be looking to go one better than in 2019 by winning gold.







Two years ago, the team of Emil Barber, Brinn Bevan, Joe Cemlyn-Jones, Josh Cook and Jacob Edwards won silver behind Norway (Sofus Heggemsnes, Odin Kalvø, Stian Skjerahaug and Harald Wibye) with Scotland's team of Kelvin Cham, Cameron Lister, Cameron Lynn, Rory Smith and David Weir in third to bag bronze.

It has been 10 years since the Welsh MAGs last won team gold at this event. That triumph in Sweden back in 2011 was part of a four-year run on the podium between 2008-11.

Team Wales Commonwealth Games gymnasts Grant Gardiner, Robert Hunter, Clinton Purnell, Alex Rothe, Matthew Hennessey, Jac Davies, Iwan Mepham, Harry Owen, Robert Sansby and Josh Cook have all featured in past editions of the Northern Europeans.

2018 Gold Coast gymnast Benji Eyre was part of the Wales MAG team who won silver at the 2017 Northern Europeans staged in the Faroe Islands and returns this weekend along with 2016 Olympian Brinn Bevan, Joe Cemlyn-Jones, Jacob Edwards and Emil Barber.

Emil, of course, won gold on vault last time while Brinn and Joe, who have also just returned from Japan competing for Great Britain at this year's Artistic World Championships, both enjoyed individual apparatus success in 2019.

Joe won gold on parallel bars and high bar and will be looking to defend those titles. He also took silver in the all-around in Iceland, as well as claiming bronze on the pommel horse and rings. Brinn, meanwhile, bagged pommel horse gold two years ago.

Other MAGs to look out for this weekend include Sofus Heggemsnes, who was part of the Norway men's team who won gold in 2019.

Sofus is also the reigning individual Northern Europeans men's all-around champion as well as the defending champion on floor. He also comes into event fresh from making the all-around final at the World Championships.

Scotland's men's team includes two of the team who won bronze at the last Northern Europeans in Cameron Lynn and 2018 Commonwealth Games team bronze medallist David Weir.

Women's artistic gymnast Mali Neurauter helped Norway win women's team silver two years ago while 2019 champion on vault Camille Rasmussen, from Denmark, returns. Camille, having also just competed at the World Championships, took bronze in the individual all-around in 2019.

Also returning is Iida Haapala, who helped Finland win team bronze in 2019.

Ireland's team includes Emma Slevin, who last month made history by becoming the first Irish gymnast to qualify for the women's all-around final at the World Championships, eventually finishing 19th.

Photography Regulations

In order to protect the welfare of children at the event, photography at this event is permitted only on conditions set by Welsh Gymnastics and British Gymnastics.

This is a summary of those conditions. A copy of the full text can be obtained from the Competition Organiser or from the British Gymnastics website www.british-gymnastics.org. If you do not agree to these conditions you may not bring any photo equipment into the venue or take any photos.

- 1. 'Photos' includes any form of video or still image including those taken with mobile phones.
- 2. The Competition Organiser (or a person acting on his or her authority) may require anyone at the event:
 - a. Not to take photos either generally or in particular circumstances.
 - b. To provide their full name and address and evidence of this.
 - c. To let the Competition Organiser view any images recorded and to delete any images.
 - d. To surrender media or equipment on which the images have been recorded if they cannot be viewed (e.g. photos on traditional film), or if they cannot be deleted.
- 3. Photos may only be taken and used in accordance with the British Gymnastics Child Protection Policy.
- 4. Photos may not be used, distributed or copied for commercial purposes.
- 5. Flash may not be used at any time while gymnasts are warming up or competing.
